Englewood undertakes energy-efficiency improvements

Over the last several years, the City of Englewood has implemented many energy-saving measures. We have installed energy-efficient lighting in City facilities and traffic signals and launched technology initiatives that save staff time and cut down on energy usage.

Now we are taking it to the next level. Working with the Governor's Energy Office, we are planning a comprehensive evaluation of energy efficiency at all City facilities. An initial feasibility study indicates that, with a 10 percent reduction in energy use, the City should be able to realize significant cost savings that can help fund future improvements.

A project team has been assembled that includes representatives from several City departments. Working with a qualified Energy Service Company (ESCO), this team will oversee the planning process and work to implement this city-wide energy savings initiative.

The first step in the process is an energy audit, which will measure the efficiency of our current systems. More importantly, the audit will determine where improvements can be made. The audit will cover a wide variety of

energy-related items, including gas, electric, and water usage, water and wastewater treatment processes, and streetlights.

The 10 percent reduction in energy use initially recommended in the feasibility study is only a starting point. Following the comprehensive energy audit, the team will work with the ESCO and take advantage of other resources from the Governor's Energy Office to develop a project plan. The plan is likely to include a citywide effort by all employees. The plan will also include evaluation measures so we can track our progress as we implement the recommended improvements.

The process is likely to have benefits beyond energy-efficiency improvements. It will help the City of Englewood plan for the implementation of renewable energy technologies, such as solar. It will also help us set goals for sustainability and community education programs.

On another "green" front, the City of Englewood has formed an employee Recycling Team whose goal is to reduce the City's waste stream by expanding our current recycling programs. Englewood has had an office paper recycling program in place for years. Last year alone, City employees recycled enough paper to save over 500 trees. In addition to expanding the recycling program, the team will also analyze opportunities to increase the number of recycled and environmentally-friendly products City employees use on a daily basis.

The results of both these initiatives will be reported in future editions of the *Englewood Citizen* newsletter.

It's almost February *Is your TV ready?*

At midnight on February 17, 2009, all full-power television stations will switch from analog to digital broadcasts. If you have an analog television, you will need a converter that switches the signal from analog to digital.

To help with this process, Congress created a TV Converter Box Coupon Program for people who wish to keep using their analog television sets after the switch to digital. The program allows U.S. households to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40, that can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes.

A television connected to cable, satellite or other pay service does not require a converter box from this program.

State announces new income levels on Colorado Property/Rent/Heat Rebate program

The State of Colorado offers a rebate program on property tax and heating expenses for low-income seniors and people with disabilities. Eligible applicants can receive a rebate of up to \$600 of their property tax paid and \$192 of their heating expenses paid during 2008. The income eligibility threshold levels have increased by \$1,000 for the 2008 program.

New Maximum Income Levels:

- For a single person: Less than \$12,000
- For a married couple: Less than \$15,700

Rebate Eligibility Requirements:

• You (either husband or wife) must be 65 or older by December 31, 2008, or must

be a surviving spouse at least 58 years old, or must have been disabled for the entire year, regardless of age.

- You must have resided in Colorado during the entire year.
- You must be lawfully present in the United States.
- You must not be claimed as a dependent on any other person's income tax return.
- You must have paid property tax, rent, and/or heating expenses during 2008.

News from Neighborhood Services Living with wildlife in Englewood

Englewood is home to a wide variety of wildlife, including squirrels, skunks, fox, raccoons, coyotes, and wild birds. These animals are all considered normal urban wildlife.

Discouraging Wildlife

There are actions that can be taken to discourage wildlife from visiting your property:

- Feed pets indoors or remove food dishes from dog and cat enclosures each evening.
- Cut and thin dense vegetation such as weeds and brush.
- Seal access to areas under porches and sheds that may be attractive as denning sites.
- Store trash in covered containers and do not put it out before the morning of scheduled pick-up.

- Use window well covers to prevent skunk, young foxes, and raccoons from becoming entrapped in window wells.
- Screen chimneys and vents to prevent wildlife from getting into your house.
- Do not feed wild animals. These animals must be kept wild for the protection of both the animal and humans. Wild animals that have become tame often inflict accidental bites.

Keeping Pets Safe

There have been several reports of coyotes in Englewood recently. Keep a watchful eye on your pets, as small dogs and cats outside at night are an attractive food source for coyotes.

Beginning with this edition of the *Englewood Citizen*, the Englewood Police Department's Neighborhood Services Division will contribute a regular column to the newsletter. Neighborhood Services includes Code Enforcement, Community Relations, Traffic Enforcement, and Parking Enforcement. The article in this edition discusses wildlife in Englewood.

Trapping Wildlife

Code Enforcement will respond if there is a very sick, injured, or dead wild animal in the neighborhood, but we do not trap wild animals or interfere with healthy wildlife which might be considered a nuisance by a resident. If you are experiencing a problem with nuisance wildlife, there are companies listed in the phone book under exterminators which will trap the nuisance wildlife for a fee. Due to state restrictions on wildlife relocation, the City of Englewood cannot provide this service.
